Governor Reynolds, on behalf of our Chairma John Ruan III and Janis Ruan and my wife Le and all of us at the World Food Prize, I want to say how grateful we are to you and First Gentleman Kevin Reynolds for presiding at tonight's ceremony. House Speaker Linda Upmeyer, like me you are retiring soon, I am so glad you could be here so we could thank you for your encouragement and support. I also want to acknowledge Senators Mark Lofgren and William Dotzler and Representative Jo Oldsen. thank you. Thank you for the incomparable privilege of holding our ceremony here in the magnificent lowa State Capitol over the last 20 years.

I want to say a special word of welcome to Secretary Tom Vilsack, who was Governor of when I visited him in his office to ask if we could hold our ceremony here in the Capitol. He didn't know me, and I think he thought I was some deranged person; I saw him reaching under his desk for the button that summons the state troopers to remove a dangerous person, so I quickly said, it's for Dr. Borlaug. Why didn't you say so, and immediately approved it. Then I came up and met the Republican leaders of the legislature and when they heard Norm's name they agreed.

Yesterday, October 16th was World Food Day, we are so honored to have an array of distinguished international guests, including 17 World Food Prize Laureates. There is more life saving achievement assembled here at the lowa State Capitol then at any other World Food Day event anywhere around the globe.

It was John Ruan III who convinced me to return to lowa in 1999 to carry forward the vision that his father and Norman Borlaug had laid out. It has only been with John's support and guidance that we have been able to build The World Food Prize for these past two decades to fulfill his Dad's and Norm's dreams.

John Ruan III please stand up so that we all can thank you and the Ruan family for all that you have done for the World Food Prize.

Janis Ruan and the entire Ruan Family, thank you for all you have done to support the World Food Prize. As Norman Borlaug often said, there would not be a World Food Prize except for the generosity of the Ruan Family.

It was 10 years ago that Norm left us. At the 2009 ceremony, I left open the chair that Norm always occupied and have continued to do since then, to commemorate Dr. Norman Borlaug's achievements and reflect his ongoing inspiration.

Quinn: Norman Borlaug and John Ruan shared passion. In 1994 they added an element to the World Food Prize - a Youth Institute with 14 Iowa high school students and 3 Nobel Peace Prize recipients.

Today, as we celebrate its 25th anniversary, the World Food Prize has grown significantly. But, to tell you about what happens at a World Food Prize Youth Institute I invited back one of our most remarkable alums of our Global Youth Institute.

You may have seen her on TV as the youngest-ever female CNN Heroes recognized for being the founder and executive director of the MEANS Database, an anti-hunger non-profit tech company operating in 49 U.S. states, D.C. and Canada.

Laube - My father always considered himself a teacher. I know he is deeply grateful for all that you have done to inspire the several thousand students who participate in our programs each year.

Quinn: We have three other groups here tonight who are also inspired by Dr. Borlaug. The USDA-Borlaug Fellows program, and the Borlaug-Adesina Fellows,

from Africa who were just launched today and supported by our own 2017 Laureate Dr.
Akinwumi Adesina and his World Hunger Fighters Foundation, and the Fraley-Borlaug Scholar from the University of Illinois. They are up in the Borlaug Balcony.

7:45 Quinn: I have another marvelous youth story—over the past 20 years, I have endeavored to include in the Laureate Award Ceremony entertainment and cultural performances that bring attention to our founders Norman Borlaug and John Ruan Sr. and our new Laureate all while inspiring the world in the fight against hunger.

I have commissioned a symphony to be written with maestro Joseph Giunta and the Des Moines Symphony Orchestra, arranged for Ray Charles to perform at Ceremony when it was held at Iowa State University, brought the Tokyo String Quartet to Des Moines

and two years ago, in an evening which made Laureate Akinwumi Adesina and his wife Grace legends for their dancing, we were honored to welcome Omawumi, the West African Idol and Nigerian pop star.

As we played that video of Dr. Adesina and Grace dancing, I saw a worried look on Simon Groot's face - don't worry - we won't be asking you to dance. I was wondering what I would do after I retire. Maybe I could start a new TV show, "Dancing with the Laureates."

Continuing with our theme on youth, I wanted to find performers who might have meaning to you, Simon Groot. I know that East West Seed operates in Brazil where you have developed the semi-dwarf Bela nova papaya, somewhat like Norman Borlaug's semi-dwarf wheat.

Well we were not able to import any of those papaya for tonight, we do have another import from Brazil that will bring back some wonderful memories and that represents a great story. When they were 19-year-old twins living in an urban favela in Rio, their mother had them take violin lessons in an effort to keep them from being caught up in gang culture.

Driving to work in 2006 I heard a story about them on Iowa Public Radio and brought them here to Iowa where they performed at our Laureate Award Ceremony in 2006 to honor our Laureates from Brazil.

In the Netherlands, you have a King to issue proclamations. In lowa we don't have a King, we have a governor, and we are very honored to have lowa's Governor here tonight.

During her time as Lieutenant Governor she was a great friend to the World Food Prize and she has continued that interest and involvement as Iowa's first female governor. She has been a leader in promoting STEM education and every year she has been with us at our Iowa Youth Institute, our Iowa Hunger Summit, and our Laureate Award Ceremony.

So now, to issue the official Laureate Proclamation, it is my great personal privilege to introduce the 43rd Governor of lowa, the Honorable Kim Reynolds.

Van Oort: At this time we invite, the World Food Prize chairman John Ruan III to join our Laureate on the Dias. We are also honored to invite the President of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, His Excellency Felix Tshisekidi; Ambassador Andre Haspels, of the Netherlands; Dr. Gebisa Ejeta, the Chair of the World Food Prize Selection Committee; the Deputy Vice Minister of Agriculture, of the Netherlands Marije Beens; and also from the Netherlands and a member of the World Food Prize Council of Advisors, the President of Wageningen (VAG IN ENG IN) University, Dr. Louise Fresco to join Mr. Ruan in presenting the Prize.

Quinn: Now, I invite our Laureate to offer your remarks.

8:19 Quinn: I invite our laureate to return to his seat. We have one more special presentation as part of our Laureate Award Ceremony.

Quinn: When Simon Groot arrived in the Philippines in the 1980s to start what would become a global vegetable seed revolution, it was a time that represented the confluence of several other revolutions, each with an interesting World Food Prize connection.

At The International Rice Research Institute in Los Banos, the first World Food Prize Laureate Dr. M.S. Swaminathan was presiding over the continuation of the Green Revolution in rice, that had started under Laureate Hank Beachel and was being carried forward by Laureate Gurdev Khush, who is with us tonight.

At the same time, The People Power Revolution lead by President Corazon Aquino, turned out a dictator and dramatically restored the country to democratic rule.

I had the privilege to support the new President's efforts as the Deputy US Ambassador in Manila.

I was so proud 20 years later when President Aquino accepted my offer to become a member of the World Food Prize Council of Advisors.

And there was a revolution in music as two Filipina teenagers, Lea Salonga and Monique Wilson, were chosen to play the lead in a new musical Miss Saigon.

And my wife Le Son, my own Miss Saigon, and I joined in sending them off to Broadway with a reception at our embassy.

I asked myself who could we get that could musically honor our Laureate and his Filipino partner, and bring together all of these events. I was stymied until I spoke to my daughter Kelly, who lives in London. She told me that there was an amazing singer from the Philippines starring in Hamilton in London. She has flown here tonight to help recall all of those revolutions and honor Simon Groot's great achievements.

Tonight she will perform Bayan
Ko in tribute to the late President
Aquino, and a medley of songs
from her Broadway career
including the Movie in my Mind
from Miss Saigon,

and in honor of our distinguished Laureate who has risen to the challenge of changing the lives of millions of farmers in over 60 countries, she will close the program with the popular smash hit, Rise Up. Please welcome, the international Broadway star, Rachelle Ann Go. (Ray-shell Ann Go)
