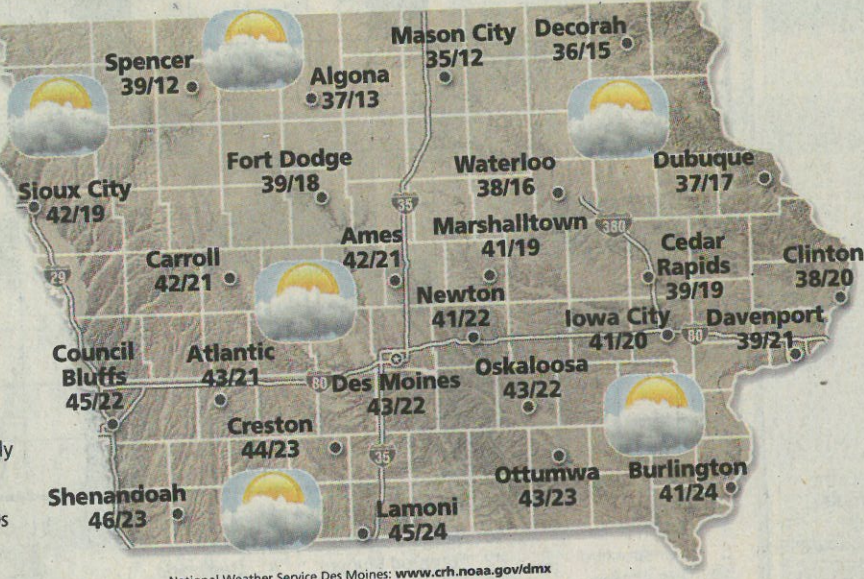

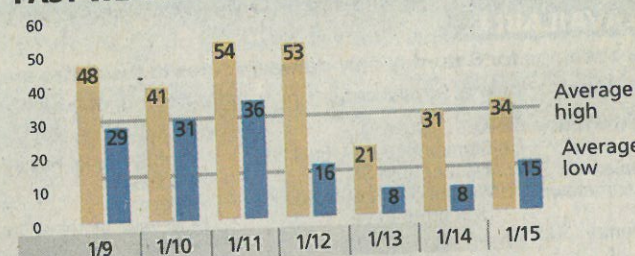

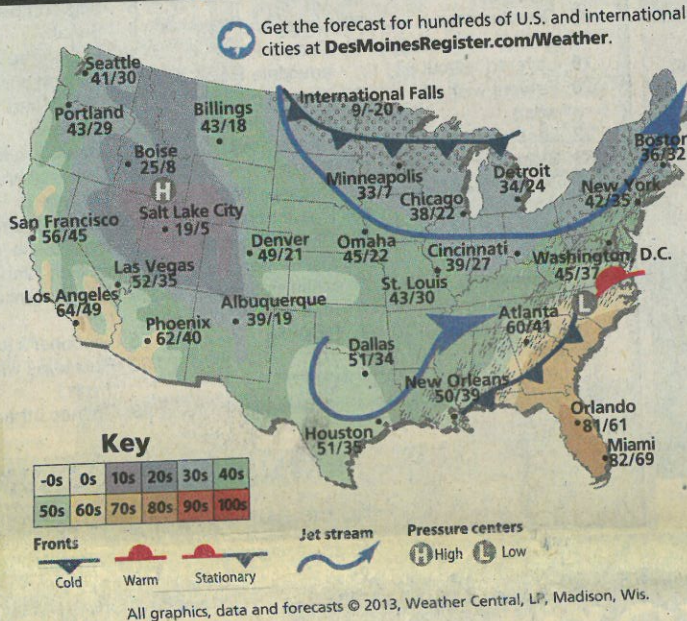

Author uses Lincoln to teach leadership

President's style is still relevant, valuable today

Pulitzer Prize-winning author Doris Kearns Goodwin offered leadership lessons from 150 years ago for a 125-year-old business group on Tuesday. Kearns Goodwin spoke to about 1,100 people at the Greater Des Moines Partnership's annual dinner. The Oscar-nominated Stephen Spielberg film "Lincoln" is based in part on Kearns Goodwin's best-selling book, "Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln." "His leadership style has relevance for all of us," Kearns Goodwin told the group of executives, economic development officials and politicians. She urged members of the partnership, which is celebrating its 125th anniversary this year, to respect and learn from its long history of collaborating and serving the community. She said Lincoln put together one of the most re-

markable cabinets in history by calling on his chief rivals—cunning men who opposed him, underestimated him, even tried to defeat and humiliate him. Friends warned him that it was a mistake, but Lincoln responded that the country was in peril. "He said, 'I need them by my side,'" Kearns Goodwin said. "Lincoln never made permanent enemies," she said. "He knew that politics is a continuing game of human relations." She imparted a few of Lincoln's leadership lessons: » Listen to differing points of view. Lincoln's subordinates felt free to disagree with the presi-

first term and ask, "Did I spend enough time with Congress? ... Was I in the field or in the bubble of the White House? ... Did I communicate enough?"

She also offered a lesson from another president, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, whose first term was marked by hostility with business leaders. FDR, she said, learned to reach out to business, giving incentives for them to power the war effort.

» Give others credit. Lincoln created an "emotional bank account" with his advisers and generals by giving them credit for accomplishments.

» Shoulder the blame. Lincoln further engendered loyalty by defending advisers who had made mistakes, including his first secretary of war, Simon Cameron, whose mistakes endangered the Union effort.

» Be aware of weaknesses, and find advisers

who have different strengths.

» Control emotions. She said when Lincoln was angry with generals or others, he would write a letter, but then put it aside, knowing it would paralyze their decision making. If he did lose his temper, he would quickly follow with a kind gesture, preventing resentment.

» Relax and replenish your soul. Lincoln would "whistle off sadness" by attending the theater more than 100 times during the war and by relying on his sense of humor. He was known for funny stories, she said, while sharing some of the president's off-color jokes.

» When there's a crisis, go into the field. Today this is known as "management by walking around." By meeting with troops, Lincoln boosted morale and created bonds—eventually ensuring his re-election.

Most of all, she concluded, Lincoln was driven by his ambition to leave the world a better place for having lived in it. "He was powered by the moral fiber of his character and integrity," she said.
